#### ABOUT THE AUDIT

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of the Whatcom Council of Governments from January 1, 2012 through December 31, 2013.

We evaluated internal controls and performed audit procedures on the activities of the Council. We also determined whether the Council complied with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity or area. Instead, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of noncompliance, misappropriation or misuse. The following areas were examined during this audit period:

#### **ABOUT THE COUNCIL**

The Whatcom Council of Governments is an inter-governmental organization that coordinates projects primarily relating to transportation issues to mutually benefit the member entities. Established in 1966 as a multi-jurisdictional body, each appointed member of the Council represents local governments in Whatcom County, which serve an estimated 207,600 citizens. The Council has a staff of 12 employees. In fiscal year 2012 and 2013, the Council operated on budgets of approximately \$2.1 million and \$2.5 million, respectively.

The majority of the Council's funding comes from federal, state and local grants along with local dues. The governing officials of the Council consist of an Executive Board and Full Council. The Full Council is a 20-member board comprised of elected representatives of local general purpose and special district governments throughout Whatcom County. The Executive Board carries out the responsibilities of day-to-day Council activities. Mayors, Executives, Commissioners and Council Members of participating local governments serve as Board Members. As of December 31, 2013, the Full Council included representatives from the following local governments: city of Bellingham, city of Blaine, city of Everson, city of Ferndale, city of Lynden, city of Nooksack, city of Sumas, Whatcom County, Port of Bellingham, Birch Bay Water and Sewer District and Lake Whatcom Water and Sewer District.
